## **The National Sovereignty and Resilience Act**

Committee-by-committee jurisdiction, provisions, and referral strategy

A routing reference for committee staff and counsel: which NSRA titles fall in each panel's lane, the lead provisions, the sequencing playbook, and the highest-probability standalone entry points. A companion to the general Legislative Packet.

## How to Use This Package

Titles are mapped to committees using published House and Senate jurisdictional rules (Rules X and XXV). For each committee, this package lists the NSRA titles in its primary lane, the lead provisions, and a short note on how the provision is drafted to move — as a standalone vehicle, a companion bill, or a sequential referral. Where two panels have plausible claims to the same provision, the sequencing playbook (page 5) gives the drafting response. Every figure referenced is an NSRA model estimate on published baselines; official CBO/JCT scoring is pending and invited.

# Cross-Committee Sequencing Playbook

---

Jurisdictional sequencing — not constitutional durability — is the primary procedural obstacle. The five highest-probability bottlenecks and the drafting response to each:

## **Finance vs. HELP (Senate) — Pharma parity**

Frame the compulsory-licensing trigger as a Medicare pricing mechanism (Finance primary) with an FDA implementation rider (HELP secondary); a joint hearing resolves sequencing. Precedent: IRA 2022.

## **Ways & Means vs. Energy & Commerce (House) — Healthcare**

Title II as a clean revenue/eligibility core (W&M); Title III as a standalone delivery-system title (E&C). They travel as companions that conference together.

## **Banking vs. Judiciary (Senate) — Housing / due process**

Give Title XVIII its own referral path (Judiciary primary, Banking secondary) — it is already a standalone framework, and separating it strengthens the constitutional record.

## **Armed Services vs. Commerce — Semiconductors**

National-security findings in the preamble make Armed Services primary; Commerce takes sequential referral on domestic-manufacturing incentives (CHIPS model).

## **Finance vs. Agriculture — Household stability**

Draft the Household Stability Guarantee as a SIFR expenditure authorization (Finance / W&M), not a SNAP amendment — the only path that avoids Agriculture obstruction.

# Priority Standalone Entry Points

---

The practical question is which provisions can enter the record as standalone or amendment vehicles — reinforcing that the Act is strongest whole but viable in parts.

## **Pharmaceutical parity — Finance / Ways & Means**

Highest standalone probability; the automatic compulsory-licensing trigger is the novel element. File standalone first to establish the timestamped legislative record. Sponsor profile: Finance members with Medicare/Medicaid assignments who have filed drug-pricing bills.

## **Veteran healthcare — Veterans' Affairs**

Title XXV; the author's VA background is the credibility anchor. Highest-value validators are former VA Secretaries.

## **Manufacturing & supply-chain sovereignty — Commerce / Armed Services**

Titles XI and XXXII align with existing CHIPS infrastructure and command the broadest coalition — economic nationalists, defense hawks, and industrial-policy advocates.
